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Title ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION PLAN 2019

SUMMARY

This paper reports on the 2018 Environmental Conference and presents a proposed Environmental Action Plan for 2019. The Policy & Scrutiny Committee is invited to consider and comment on the prioritised activities.

BACKGROUND

The council's Corporate Plan 2017-2020 identifies "Protect and nurture the environment and heritage" as a core value and specifies the following activity for Environment & Heritage:

"Work with partners and key stakeholders to deliver an environmental conference with a view to agreeing and implementing an audit of the local environment to inform delivery and monitoring of the creation of a long-term protection and improvement plan."

Environmental Conference

In June 2018 the council hosted an Environmental Conference at Cowes Yacht Haven (see Appendix 1 for agenda). The Conference brought together experts and enthusiasts to consider how the Island can secure a low carbon, resource efficient and environmentally sensitive future. The best suggestions would shape a new Environmental Action Plan which the council will develop during 2018.

The Conference heard about good practice on the Island across the public, private and voluntary sectors and launched the Chamber of Commerce's Green Impact Programme and the Island's Biosphere Reserve nomination. Secondary school students participated in table discussions and a poster competition.

The council highlighted its existing environmental activity including progress on recycling, installation of electric vehicle charge points, home insulation scheme,

Carbon Management Plan, Access Fund sustainable travel programme, Estuaries project and progress on the Plastic-free Island.

The Conference was attended by 170 delegates suggesting great enthusiasm amongst the Island community for the environmental agenda. The Twitter reach was 75,213 for the iweconf hashtag and the Facebook reach was 5,200. Articles appeared in the County Press, On the Wight, IW Radio and Island Echo.

Workshop sessions covered 15 themes (see Appendix 2), each led by an experienced and knowledgeable facilitator. Delegates could participate in 3 different themes during the day. Each workshop was asked to agree on 3 suggested activities for the forthcoming Environmental Action Plan and 1 (one) suggestion relevant to planning policy for the forthcoming Island Planning Strategy. It was made clear that each table would agree, through consensus, which 3 activities they would like to prioritise and put forward. In considering this, they were asked to be mindful of what the council and its partners would be capable of delivering, given the limited resources available.

Since the conference, the Cabinet Member for Environment & Heritage (Cllr Hobart) and Cabinet Member for Procurement, Waste Management, Special Projects and Forward Planning (Cllr Murwill) have been considering the suggestions put forward by the workshop groups and prioritising those for further consideration. In doing so, they have considered whether the council has a role in delivery, the potential impact of the activity and the likely cost of implementation, given that no new resources have been identified for delivery of environmental activities. The timescale for delivery was also considered, as Members were keen to prioritise activities that could be progressed during 2019.

Recommendations

In reviewing the suggestions, a number of themes emerged relating to (i) council procurement, (ii) public information and marketing, (iii) regeneration and (iv) council policy. The suggestions and responses for each of these are shown below:

(i) Council procurement

- Water awareness and conservation (in partnership with Southern Water and the Footprint Trust)
- Internal promotion of the Cycle to Work Scheme

The council's Regeneration agenda was presented at the conference and a number of suggestions related specifically to these plans:

(iv) Council policy

Numerous suggestions were received on areas where council policy could be developed or enhanced to improve environmental standards. These were:

- Plastic-free policy
- Fracking and drilling
- EV charge points
- Business travel
- Environmental standards for tenders
- Rights of Way maximising use for cyclists and horse riders
- Verge management

Whilst policy development can be a lengthy and time-consuming process, it is clear that a robust policy framework can have a positive impact above and beyond individual projects or activities which can be time-limited and dependent on funding. It is still unclear whether the council can produce a separate policy on fracking and drilling given the need to maintain an impartial role as the Local Planning Authority, but there is now evidence that other Planning Authorities are making statements on their opposition to fracking and incorporating this into planning policy. The council will observe these developments. With this exception, the council will endeavour to develop two specific policies per year, starting with an internal policy promoting sustainable business travel (a Green Travel Plan) and an internal plastic-free policy.

Planning Policy

Suggestions relating to the development of the Island Planning Strategy were also sought and these, along with responses from the team leading development of the Strategy, are shown below:

Suggested Policy Approach	Response

Governance

Next Steps

Policy & Scrutiny Committee is invited to consider the proposed Environmental Action Plan for 2019 and to comment on the content and delivery of these activities. Cabinet Members recognise that there is considerable environmental expertise within the Committee and outside in the wider community and are keen to tap into this expertise to reach the most productive outcome. There is much ambition to progress environmental issues but, under the current financial constraints, it is recognised that this can only be done with existing resources or, where necessary, by securing external funding.

The council is also aware of the Green City Charter recently launched by Southampton City Council which is designed to move Southampton towards a low carbon city, cleaner economy, and greener landscape. The council will study this Charter in detail to see whether any of the proposals could be incorporated into future plans.
