Oral Questions

Carly Wyre-Nock of Freshwater asked a question regarding performance being singled out as the reason for proposed closure of All Saints CE Primary School.

The Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Education and Skills clarified that no decision had been taken. It was noted that when establishing a preferred option, he considered low levels of numbers, three consecutive Requires Improvement 'Ofsted' judgements, and the geographical location.

A supplementary question was asked, and it was clarified that only eight parents had chosen to send their children to the school which in turn impacted on the viability and quality of education in the coming years.

Becky Powell of Freshwater asked a question with regard to a rejected call-in and the Leader clarified the process for call-in.

A supplementary question was asked with regard to concerns over not having a fair consultation and the Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Education and Skills clarified that the delegated decision was in fact to commence a consultation to undertake a consultation.

Stefan Powell of Freshwater asked a question into the reasoning behind the proposed closure of All Saints School being the preferred option in the delegated decision report.

The Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Education and Skills clarified that all reports have a preferred option and that the best option would always be the option that is in the interest of children of the West Wight.

Victoria Bassill of Freshwater asked a question with regard to ensuring that children are not displaced from All Saints Primary School in September. The Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Education and Skills clarified that no final decision had been taken.

A supplementary question was asked regarding the Published Admission Number and it was confirmed that this would not be reduced.

Agenda item	Integration of Continuing Healthcare
Decision reference	72 (18/19)
Summary of Discussion	The Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care & Public Health presented the report on the proposed integration of NHS Continuing Healthcare (CHC) function with the council's Adult Social Care Commissioning to create a single team.
Decision taken	Option 2 - That Cabinet notes the progress to date in relation to the integration of the CHC functions with Adult Social Care and agrees the inclusion of the CHC budget within the Better Care Fund s.75 from 1 April 2019.
Reason for the decision and corporate objective it aligns with	To align with one of the key activities in the Corporate Plan 2017 – 2020, namely Wellbeing. This proposal contributes directly to outcomes for wellbeing by supporting people and ensuring that vulnerable people are supported and protected. The proposal furthers the integration of Adult Social Care and Health and will contribute directly to the delivery of the Care Close to Home strategy.
Options considered and rejected	Option 1 – To continue to operate separately and not to integrate the CHC function with Adult Social Care.

Agenda Item	Cross-Solent Travel Scheme – NHS Recharge
Decision Reference	73 (18/19)
Summary of Discussion	The Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care and Public Health presented the report seeking a decision for the Isle of Wight Council to continue to provide funding to support the NHS Trust's Cross Solent Travel Discretionary Scheme, which provides reimbursement of ferry fares for people travelling to the mainland for chemotherapy, radiotherapy or renal dialysis.
	Joanna Smith of Healthwatch was invited to present the outcome of the independent Healthwatch consultation and advised the overwhelming view was to continue the funding.
	The chairman noted that the Scrutiny Committee had recommended the report be endorsed at its meeting on 12 March 2019. The Cabinet Member for Infrastructure and Transport took the opportunity to advise that all three ferry companies offer a discount scheme for patients, and carers, which could include car travel.
Decision taken	Option B – To grant fund the NHS Trust an annual sum of £60,000 funded from within the existing Adult Social Care budget, with agreement that this be used to support patient transport. The scope of eligibility for this funding will be determined by the IW NHS Trust.
Reason for decision and corporate objective it aligns with	To align with one of the key activities in the Corporate Plan 2017 – 2020, namely Wellbeing in that the community needs are met by the best public services possible, and that vulnerable people are supported.
Options considered and rejected	Option A - To continue to operate a recharge agreement with the NHS Trust to reimburse ferry travel under the same terms as the existing agreement. This would not provide any saving and would still only support a limited group of people with specific conditions. This option leaves the council open to challenge regarding the inequitable nature of the scheme. This challenge is increasingly likely with advances in medicine leading to the increasing use of alternative cancer treatments such as Immunotherapy and Radioactive Iodine Treatment which fall outside of the scope of the recharge agreement. Greater public awareness of the discretionary scheme is likely to result in an increase in funding needed to support this scheme.
	Option C - To withdraw Council funding from the current scheme in line with the agreed 2018/19 budget strategy. This will achieve the full saving of £60,000. Following this course of action could put the council at reputational risk as it could indicate a lack of regard for the consultation outcomes.
	Option D - To provide additional funding to support cross Solent travel for a wider range of patients thereby removing the current in equitability. There is no additional funding available to support this option or legal duty to do so.

Summary of Discussion	The Leader presented the report and took the opportunity to allow the cabinet members to comment on their respective portfolios.
	The Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Business Development advised that good progress was being made across Regeneration and an increasing number of enquiries had been received from businesses looking to expand on the Island.
	The Cabinet Member for Planning and Housing advised that the length of the Island Plan consultation had been doubled in response to feedback from Town and Parish Councils.
	The Leader confirmed on behalf of the Cabinet Member for Community Safety and Public Protection that both Hampshire and the Isle of Wight had agreed to the Combined Fire Authority subject to approval from the Home Secretary.
	The Cabinet Member for Procurement, Waste Management, Special Projects and Forward Planning advised on the various initiatives being promoted with regards to recycling. The new waste recycling centre on Forest Road would open in Autumn 2019 and would hopefully enable the Island to become number one in the country for recycling.
	The Cabinet Member for Environment and Heritage noted that Dr Phillip Sterling who ran Dorset's Verges and Highway Areas would hopefully give a talk in April 2019 on how to get wildflowers in the verges to encourage pollination and bees.
	The Leader advised on behalf of the Cabinet Member for Resources that the budget for 2019-20 had been set. A shortfall planned against actual expenditure of £3 million had been made during 2018-19 through careful budget management, which would go into future planning for the island.
Decision taken	To note the performance in relation to the council's priorities as set out in this report and the priority report detail as set out in Appendix A, together with the council's financial position as set out at Appendices B and C.
Reason for decision and corporate objective it aligns with	To align with the key activities in the Corporate Plan 2017 – 2020, namely the ongoing management and monitoring of performance data, the council's strategic risk profile and financial situation, required to support the successful delivery of the agreed council priorities.
