- (c) That the process for the distribution of the on Island travel lump sum be left

unchanged. This is currently based on the distribution of a lump sum divided between the members on the basis of a formula reflecting distance of county hall from their homes and office they hold. However, the panel will continue to keep this under review in future reports.

21. Motions submitted under Procedure Rule 9 of the Council's Constitution

(i) By Michael Lilley

Councillor Lilley moved the following motion which was duly seconded:

THAT the IW Council resolves in principal to make Isle of Wight a dog (with a responsible owner) friendly Island by adopting the Hampshire County Council's Canine Countryside Strategy which promotes responsible dog owners and makes the Island sea and landscape a place for everyone to enjoy and recommends that Cabinet investigate the introduction of such a strategy.

An amendment changing "principal" to "principle" was accepted by the proposer and seconder and following a debate on the motion, a vote was taken and the motion fell.

(ii) By Cllr Stuart Hutchinson

Councillor Hutchinson presented the following motion which was duly seconded:

THAT Council notes the boundary review proposals for the Isle of Wight from the Local Government Boundary Commission for England (LGBCE) and further notes the consultation deadline for comment on those proposals, being 12 November 2018; Council requests the formulation of a council wide response be undertaken by the appropriate officer in discussion with the Lead Member and submitted within the designated timescales"

An amendment to the motion which added the following wording which was accepted by the proposer and seconder.:

Council is deeply disappointed that the subsequent Parliamentary Constituency boundary review, now finalised, would mean that these draft recommendations if confirmed will lead to two divisions straddling the proposed two constituencies - Fairlee & Whippingham and the 'greater' Godshill division.

Therefore, whilst recognising the difficulties, the Lead Member is requested to consider options for inclusion in the Council's response that address that anomaly, which would otherwise complicate representation for the affected residents and their councillors.

(iii) Cllr Barry Abraham

Councillor Abraham introduced his motion by stating:

The Government has recently issued a consultation document entitled 'Permitted development for shale gas exploration.' This document has been sent to all Council's in their role as Minerals Planning Authorities and proposes that temporary works for the exploration of shale gas reserves are made permitted development and therefore, not require planning permission. The proposals only relate to conventional drilling for shales gas and do not relate to fracking. The Council is required to provide formal comments by 25 October 2018, setting out its views on the proposals and answers to specific questions outlined within the consultation document. I feel that it is important that all members have the chance to consider these proposals and given the deadlines for the consultation, and as Cabinet member for Planning I would like to raise this matter as a motion for Full Council. I would ask Members to agree with Officer's draft consultation response to Government, which is:

THAT the Council notes the Government's proposals in relation to permitted development rights for shale gas exploration. This Council wishes to raise objections to the proposals and would wish to retain the ability for the Minerals Planning Authority to determine proposals for shale gas exploration.

The motion was duly seconded and an amendment to the introduction to the motion and the motion itself (indicated by the underlined) was proposed as follows:

The Government also proposes to bring the production phase of fracking under Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (NSIP), to be decided centrally by government and the planning inspectorate, thus taking decisions away from local councils. If approved, this could be extended to include other types of oil and gas exploration through secondary legislation.

THAT the Council notes the Government's proposals in relation to permitted development rights for shale gas exploration <u>and to bring the production phase of fracking under Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (NSIP).</u> This Council wishes to raise objections to the proposals and would wish to retain the ability for the Minerals Planning Authority to determine <u>all planning decisions at all stages for all types of oil and gas exploration</u>.

Therefore, this Council instructs our planning officers to respond to the government consultation accordingly, by rejecting the changes proposed for PD and NSIP as inappropriate and with the view that local plans, local planning and local democratic decisions should retain control of all local mineral and fossil fuel development.

Following debate a procedural motion to move immediately to the vote was proposed and carried.

A vote was then taken on the amendment and the amendment fell.

A second amendment to add the following wording was proposed and duly seconded:

"Further, to potentially strengthen the ability of the Island to protect its communities and geology, in particular against potentially damaging industrial processes, this Council should consider making representations to the current Glover Review, which is looking, amongst other things, at the potential extension of the boundaries of Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty, given that in such areas there is restricted potential for activities such as fracking and shale gas exploration to take place."

Following the debate a vote was then taken on the amendment and the amendment fell.

A vote was taken on the substantive motion and it was:

RESOLVED:

THAT the Council notes the Government's proposals in relation to permitted development rights for shale gas exploration. This Council wishes to raise objections to the proposals and would wish to retain the ability for the Minerals Planning Authority to determine proposals for shale gas exploration.
