The implementation of the Roadside Memorials Policy.

The Aims, Objectives and Expected Outcomes:

A Roadside Memorials Policy has been produced which sets out the council's approach in respect of the management of roadside memorials. The Council considered that a policy was required to inform the public of the Council's position with regard to roadside memorials.

The council have not had any formal written policy in place in recent years with respect to roadside memorials. Currently the council have taken a case by case approach to the management of such memorials. The introduction of formal written policy will clarify the council's position with regard to roadside memorials and will make it easier for the council to manage this area and will also provide information to the public as to what it permitted and not permitted.

The policy therefore is principally designed to give the council, Island Roads and the public greater certainty in understanding the scope of what memorials are permitted and not permitted and what action can be taken in respect of memorials.. It is hoped that the public will find real benefit from its implementation.

It is not considered that the Roadside Memorials Policy has any particular effects either positive or negative on any of the nine protected characteristics.

The policy will provide information and clarity to the general public as to the council's position with regard to the management of roadside memorials. The policy provides further information to assist the general public in understanding what types of roadside memorials may be permitted and what is not permitted. The policy also gives guidance to the councils Highways PFI service provider, Island Roads in assisting it in managing such memorials.

n respect of all communications and dealings that result from matters connected with the policy, reference shall be given to he terms of the policy. Whether persons who are making enquiries in respect of matters concerned by the policy are covered by any particular characteristic will not necessarily be known at the time contact is made and this information is not required for the purposes of investigating and managing roadside memorials.

Consideration has been given to whether there would be any impact on a specific religion or belief. The type of roadside memorial placed on the Highway has the potential to be influenced by the religion or belief of the persons involved. However, we would consider the religion or belief of the person involved would likely not be considered relevant to any decisions made about whether a roadside memorial can stay in situ and such decisions would be made primarily on highway safety grounds.

In the event a person is covered by one of the protected characteristics and it is considered to be of relevance to the circumstances of the matter this will be taken into account as part of the consideration of the matter at that time.

Evidence Considered During Screening

In drafting the Roadside Memorials Policy due regard was given to the applicability of its content to the nine protected characteristics. Consideration of enquiries with respect to this area does not indicate that any of the protected characteristics are more or less affected with regard to roadside memorials than any other characteristic or no characteristic at all.

Consideration has been given to whether there would be any impact on a specific religion or belief.

In terms of the examples of roadside memorials that we have seen recently these usually relate to the placing of flowers and soft toys by the roadside. We have however also had some small monuments placed from time to time on the Highway. The type of monument placed could be influenced by the religion or belief of the persons involved. However, we would consider that any monument which constitutes a permanent monument will not be permitted on the highway and will be removed on safety grounds. In terms of low key memorials such as the discrete placing of a small floral tribute or small soft toys at certain times of the year and for a limited duration at the roadside may be acceptable provided that there is no significant risk of driver distraction or undue risk to the individual visiting the location. The religion or belief of the person involved would likely not be considered relevant to any decisions made about a roadside memorial and such decisions would be made primarily on highway safety grounds.

Where however a person is included within one or more of the protected characteristics and that protected characteristic is considered to be relevant to the matter then this will be assessed and will be given due consideration as part of the process at that time.
